2017-18 Saw Progress Made Despite Significant Challenges

MSPE Executive Director Bruce Wylie updates the Board of Directors on the legislative session which resulted in two of MSPE's priority bills seeing passage.

Board of Directors (from Page 1)

- Approved the filing of the January 20, 2018 meetings which were approved by email ballot.
- Congratulated Andy Mueller, P.E., of Ozark Chapter who won the President's Member Recruitment challenge and received \$100.
- Applauded Chapter Presidents who were recognized for their year of service with certificates and pins, and the IT Committee who received President's certificate for their work on web and membership software changes
- Listened to NSPE Representative Tricia Hatley, PE, Southwest Region Director, report on NSPE activities and the upcoming NSPE Convention in Las Vegas on July 18-21.
- Learned the state/national agreement has been executed consistent with the Board's adoption of NSPE's Integrated Membership Model.
- Accepted proposed changes to MSPE Bylaws to comply with the new NSPE State/National Agreement.
 Following discussion, the Bylaws committee will add changes to life /retired member definitions and align Focus 85 outcomes with the bylaws.
- Designated President-Elect Bob Becnel, PE, as Missouri's House of Delegates representative to NSPE.
- Agreed Missouri will vote against the Professional Engineers of Oregon's petition to the House of Delegates to allow them to keep state-only members from a prior agreement with NSPE.

- Informed by Executive Director Bruce Wylie that MSPE's top two legislative priorities - the gas tax ballot measure and the utility legislation (SB 564) were passed. The utility measure authorizes a 6% rate cut by 8/31/18, freezes electric rates for three years from the last rate increase and caps future increases at 2.85% annually and unlocks \$1B in energy grid modernization investments over the next five years, which is expected to create more than 3,000 new jobs. MSPE also helped to block another sweep of fund from the MoAPEPLSPLA board to general revenue which would have created a license renewal fee increase for all licensed engineers.
- Adjusted the financial report for 11 months ending May 31, 2018 and revised the proposed MSPE Budget for 2018-19 to include up to \$1,000 for a legal review of the contract with GBA. After considerable discussion it was agreed to add up to \$5000 to pay Cherie Bishop for one-month of transition time, her appoximately \$6000 vacation payout and \$10,000 severance pay.
- Received the Membership Committee year-end report from Committee Chair Jason Sommerer and Membership Coordinator Stacey Meyer indicating the committee was active in recruiting, retaining members and conducting two PE Ceremonies in the Capitol with Order of the Engineer inductions. Overall, membership numbers were down nine among three-tier members along with 13 two-tier. member non-renewals. Total dues paying members stands at 721.
- Received the IT Committee final report for the year highlighting the

- WEB hosting, WEB design and Event Management work by the group.
- Accepted the Focus 85 Strategic Plan overview given by Chairman David Howe. The report is ready for review and adoption by the MSPE Board of Directors.
- Confirmed the election of MSPE's 2018-2019 Slate of Officers by "acclamation", approved John Huss, P.E., of Central Chapter, and Kyle Schomaker, P.E., of Western Chapter as the Board of Director representatives to the Executive Committee and Mitch Gibler, EI, of Central Chapter to serve as the YE representative for 2018-19.
- Acting on behalf of the Education Foundation, the Board of Directors took the following actions:
- Authorized the January 20, 2018 minutes of the MSPE Educational Foundation meeting which approved by email ballot.
- Heard a building update from Executive Director/Secretary Bruce A. Wylie who reported the downstairs tenant space was listed with a commercial realtor for 10 months but never shown to any prospects, but is not currently listed; the building foundation has been waterproofed and the front entry exterior modified to resist/ reflect storm water, and the side door to the building was recently replaced following a February 2018 vehicle crash. Insurance should pay for most of \$7,500 in damages.
- Accepted the Educational Foundation financial report for May 31, 2018 and approved the 2018-19 proposed budget which assumes no downstairs tenant, reflects no chapter grant funds, maintains MSPE's administrative

- fee at the current level and has no contribution to building fund for repairs.
- Kimel Committee Chair Breck Washam, P.E., reported the committee still needs member representatives to the various UM engineering campuses.
- In new business, it was noted the Educational Foundation should complete a strategic plan for the next 5 years.

MSPE Priorities For Gas Tax and Utility Legislation Among Bills Passed

Two pieces of legislation that priorities of were MSPE landed in the victory column when Missouri's General Assembly concluded


its 2018 legislative session on Friday, May 18 at 6:00 p.m. as provided by the Missouri Constitution.

MSPE's supported bills for a gas tax to improve the state's infrastructure and utility legislation changing the way the state's three investor-owned electric utilities are regulated were among the 153 bills the legislature passed out of 2,265 bills, joint resolutions, committee bills, revision bills and concurrent resolutions filed, almost doubling the number of truly agreed to and finally passed bills from last year. Of these bills, the legislature passed 18 budget bills - as required by the constitution - allocating \$28 billion in funding.


