## A Message From Your 2019-2020 MSPE President Bob Becnel, P.E., F.NSPE



While much of the country is self-isolated or quarantined, engineers are still working at areas that are defined as an essential business in supporting this country's critical infrastructure and defense. The important steps of keeping this country moving forward will continue long after isolation orders are lifted and the engineers of the country will be doing their part.

Some of our largest employers of engineers in the state, have been given direction to continue as an essential business and that work been occurring without a hiccup. Working on the important systems needed to maintain critical infrastructure and the defense of our country as outlined by the Department

While the March Board of Directors Meeting was held virtually, several key items did get completed on the both the Society and Foundation's agenda. First, the annual budgets for the Society and Foundation were approved. A lot of credit goes to our Treasurer Kelsie Clark and BHL's Jennifer Matzek (JJ) for preparing the budget for the Executive Committee and Board to approve in March rather than June. This change alleviates a major distraction at the Annual Meeting and gives President-Elect John Riediger more visibility into planning for the 2020-2021 year for MSPE.

Another big completion from the Foundation Board of Directors meeting was a restructuring of the **Educational Foundation** to select the Board and officers from a more broad representation of the Foundation stakeholders. This will replace using the standard MSPE Board of Directors and officers from the Foundation leadership. This restructuring will align the Foundation with a new Continued on page 3...



We hope this publication finds you well during this unprecedented time. The new year continues to offer countless opportunities for MSPE yet challenges due to COVID's impact. We have many updates to share, but first we want to thank you for your continued support of MSPE that enables us to provide and operate efficiently for you.

In light of the COVID-19 limitations, MSPE's 2020 Annual Convention will be a virtual event on Iune 15-17. The format will be very similar as business meetings will take place on Monday while PDH sessions offered on Tuesday. There is a modest registration fee to attend the event to help pay for the programming costs. Registration is now open on our website. This is a great opportunity for members to attend the virtual PDH sessions and practice division meetings who might not be able to attend in person. Thank you in advance for the support in this endeavor.

In addition to the upcoming convention, MSPE is working on multiple fronts. The 2020 Legislative Session has kept us very busy as legislators work to consider and debate bills with the session end ahead on May 15. Licensure issues have dominated MSPE advocacy efforts, fueled by stakeholders questioning the role of licensure and asserting the

claim it provides barriers to employment. Our office sends out weekly legislative updates on Fridays. We hope you take a few minutes to look them over. Our Government Relations Committee, led by Ron Black, P.E., meets monthly to review the status of the legislative session. MSPE contract lobbyist Mark Rhoads and I are in regular contact as MSPE testifies in committee hearings and we meet with legislators asserting our position.

Our Capitol Day event built on last year's event with almost two dozen members in attendance. Thanks to all who took time off from work to represent the profession under the dome. MSPE plans to continue to build its advocacy presence across the state. Stay tuned for more news.

The Society has several important events on the horizon. Our Fall PDH Days Conference will be in Jefferson City on October 27-28 and there is a PEG (Professional Engineers in Government) Session in Kansas City on September 16. We hope to see you there!

## MSPE Educational Foundation to Form New **Board of Directors**

The Board of Directors governing the MSPE's Educational Foundation (EF) will have a new look this summer. The EF Board of Directors, which has historically featured the same members of the MSPE Board of Directors, will have its own eleven-member Board populated by stakeholders solely focused on the Foundation mission.

MSPE EF is a 501(c)(3) Foundation charged with seven objectives centered on engineering education and research. It is linked to the Missouri Society of Professional Engineers, a 501(c)(6) organization that serves as a professional society representing the state's Licensed Professional Engineers. For decades, the EF and MSPE have been governed by the same Board of Directors, handling their respective business in separate but usually consecutive meetings.

Over the last several months, the EF Board of Directors considered amending its bylaws to allow the EF to have its own directors who specifically cater to the needs of the foundation. In March, the Board voted to amend the bylaws to form an eleven-member Board of Directors to take place this summer with the inaugural meeting held in June during the MSPE Convention in Columbia.

Once formed and activated, the new EF Board will meet throughout the year. EF Executive Director Travis Lowe and the team at Braden Heidner Lowe & Associates will continue to serve MSPE EF.

The new EF Board of Directors will feature representatives from functions that support the Foundation's mission and business, such as representatives from MATHCOUNTS, the Kimel Endowment, Building Committee, university representatives, a former MSPE president, a MSPE Board representative, along with at-large positions from the membership. The MSPE Treasurer will also serve as the EF Treasurer, mimicking NSPE's Treasurer with the national Educational Foundation.

The Nominating & Tellers Committee, chaired by Michael Purol, P.E., will provide dual roles for both the MSPE and EF Boards, and seek candidates for the new EF Board this spring.


### MSPE Member Satisfaction Survey

## MSPE 2020 Conference Becomes Virtual Event


